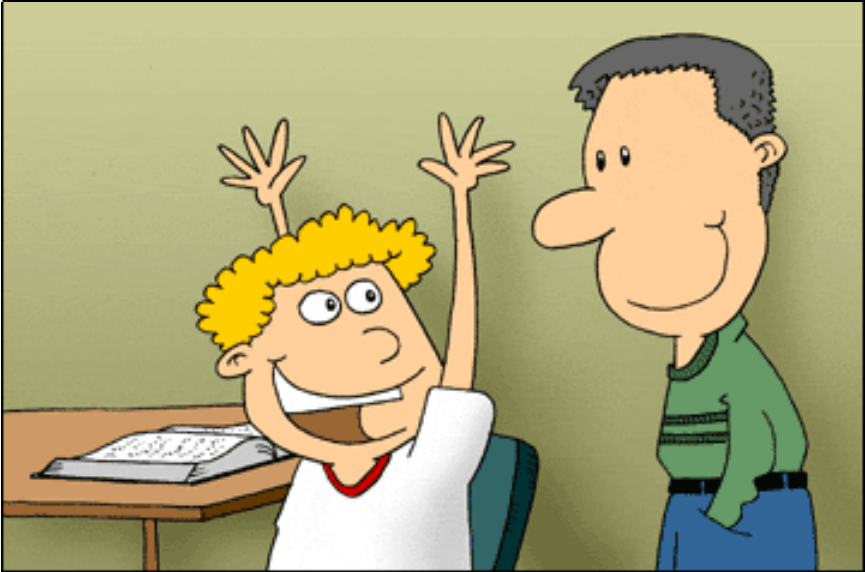

Fire

“OUR TOWN IS ON FIRE!” I almost shouted these words into the radio station microphone that early Sunday morning.

Then I continued. “If you don’t believe me, just look out your window and see the smoke and flames as they reach for the sky!”

This was the way that I—a flamboyant, and perhaps not too bright, young preacher—chose to get the attention of folks with our church radio program that morning.

It worked. I could tell by the not-too-happy stare I was getting through the glass from the only radio station employee present. He kept grabbing two ringing phones which occupied both of his ears during the entire time I was on the air. All the while I saw him shaking his head and saying he knew nothing about the fire.

I had seen the huge warehouse engulfed in flames on my way to the studio. Now I used my attention-getter to exhort folks to fireproof their future from the much-hotter flames of eternal judgment.

Several days later the local newspaper reported that a certain man had his car radio on as he and his family traveled away from town the previous Sunday morning. He had turned me off after my opening statements as he muttered something like “what will these crazy preachers come up with next?”

The man and his family returned home that night to discover that it was his warehouse that burned down. Fortunately, he was able to laugh at the irony of how my “foolish announcement” had directly involved him.

Of course destructive fires are no laughing matter. Many folks in Colorado, Arizona and New Mexico are suffering devastating losses to fires right now.

And all of us have and will suffer from fires. If we somehow escape the attacks of literal fires, we will not escape the equally devastating results of going through the fires of affliction and loss.

We all suffer in this life. At any moment we may be attacked by the “fires” of sickness, tragedy, financial loss, relationships gone bad or some other kind of trouble.

What can we do when a deadly fire threatens to destroy what is dear to us? How can we protect ourselves?

First, as the fires come into our lives we must make a choice about God in relation to those fires. If we choose to ignore Him or to blame or even curse Him, we should understand the consequences. We will be cutting ourselves off from the love, comfort, strength and other help God wants to give us during that time. We may also add fuel to the flames and make the fire hotter.

Another course of action is mentioned in Isaiah 24. Israel was going through such a tragic time that verse six said “the inhabitants of the earth are burned, and few men are left.” Then verse 15 counsels: “...glorify the Lord in the fire.”

Now there is a wise direction to take. “Glorify the Lord in the fire!” How can we do that?

Have you noticed that one of the main weapons our wildland firefighters use is fire itself? They literally “fight fire with fire” by setting new fires to burn up fuel ahead of the main fire. This strategy may help us protect ourselves, too. For example, we should...

(1) Fire up our enthusiasm. Did you know that the original meaning of “enthusiasm” is “God burning within”? If we honor and praise our awesome God it will bring a burning zeal within our lives.

(2) Fire up our dreams. Focusing on God’s vision and plan for our lives will build a hope that can sustain us through the “fires” we must face.

(3) Fire up our faith. Romans 10:17 shows us how when it says that “faith comes by hearing, and hearing by the Word of God.” As we read, study, meditate and obey the Bible our faith will be strengthened. Exercise this faith by calling upon the Lord in prayer and it will continue to grow.

Remember it is only “by grace through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ” (Ephesians 2:8-9) that our souls can be fireproofed from eternal judgment. When we do know and trust Him as our Savior and Lord the Holy Spirit wants to set our souls aflame for Him!

During a children’s sermon the pastor asked the children if they knew what “Amen” means.

Only God Knows Who's Who!



Have you ever thought what your reaction might have been had you been present long ago when Jesus introduced His twelve disciples to the public? The most important movement of all time was beginning, and these men were the first gospel team in history. Surely, our Lord would select outstanding specimens of manhood—educated, gifted in body, mind, and soul above the common run of humanity!

But who were these yokels fresh from fishing, from tax collecting for Rome, from political fanaticism? Surely Simon Peter was not the best material available! Nearly everything he said in the Gospels was a mistake! “We have left all to follow Thee. What shall we *have* therefore?” “Let us build here three tabernacles.” “Thou shalt never wash my feet.” “Lord, this shall never happen to thee.” “Thou seest the crowd thronging thee and why askest thou, who touched me?” And then, horror of horrors, on that awful night of his Lord’s trial, he cursed and swore that he never knew Jesus! Was this the best prospect available to lead the team of Twelve?

Among the Twelve were three other fishermen, Andrew, James, and John; Matthew, a Jewish tax collector for Rome; Simon Zelotes, a political enthusiast. And our Lord Himself once said to this dozen, speaking of Judas Iscariot, “Have not I chosen you and one of you is a devil?”

This just doesn’t add up! Why didn’t Jesus convert twelve Rabbis, familiar with the Scriptures, men of religion, of learning, of special abilities? What hope could there be for the gospel with a start like this?

Down through the centuries God has often dumbfounded us by the D.L. Moodys and Billy Sundays He has raised up above thousands of more promising prospects to win the multitudes to Him. Surely He is a God of infinite surprises, raising up nonentities to identities and confounding all the experts.

But, to keep the record straight, our Lord made a breathtaking exception and picked a Pharisee of Pharisees from the school of Gamaliel, who knew the Scriptures. And yet, that strange Saul of Tarsus had blazed with a bitter hatred of Christ and had put to death the first believers. He had taken off on Damascus road, exhaling threats and slaughter. No ordinary conversion would ever stop such a devil-possessed man. So the Lord knocked him down, blinded him, and called him to be the greatest gospel preacher of all time.

God selects some of all strata whether fishermen or fanatics, but not many wise, mighty, noble...so that no flesh should glory in His presence.

In 1938 I met a young man who welcomed me to the school he was attending and carried my bag into the building. I didn’t know I had just met the boy who would preach to more people than any other preacher in history. But I have given up making personal judgments as to who is the likeliest candidate. I have been fooled both ways! God is sovereign, and we never know what He will do. I am glad He doesn’t consult us!

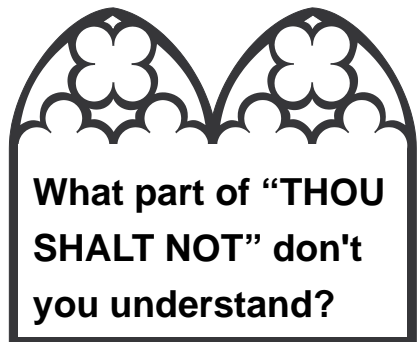
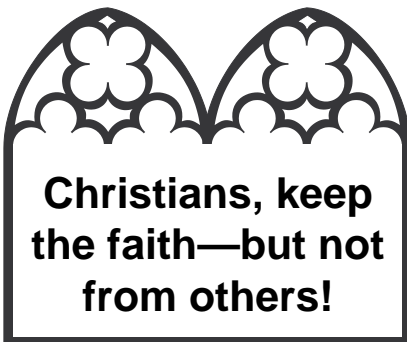
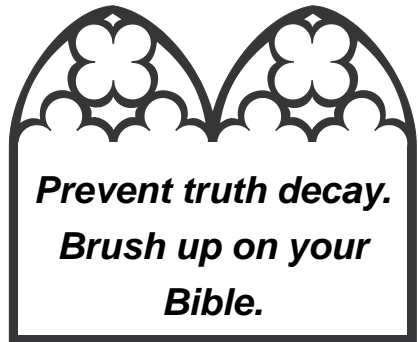
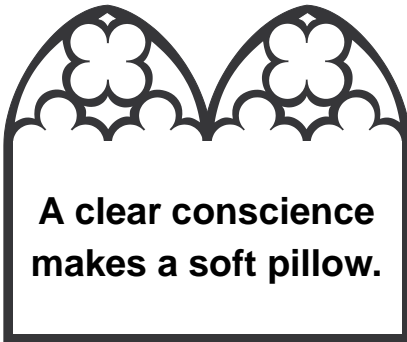


What is Teaching?

1. Teaching is the transfer of *knowledge*. To many, it is considered the displaying of knowledge. They seem to think the goal of the teacher is to show how much he knows. But teaching only takes place when the student leaves with knowledge that the teacher came in with. Teaching is transferring profound truth into simplicity so that it in turn may be transferred into profound work.
2. Teaching is a transfer of *personality*. The pupil should not only learn what the teacher knows; he should also start becoming what the teacher is. Teaching is not only the transferring of knowledge, it is the transferring of zeal, honesty, enthusiasm, optimism, generosity, and other traits that a good teacher possesses. Most of us, as we think back over our childhood and youth, can remember far more of what our teachers were like than we can of what our teachers taught.
3. Teaching is the transfer of *procedure*. Not only should the pupil learn the facts and how to adorn them with the right personality, but he should learn propriety, procedure, neatness, and orderliness if he is to be taught properly. Such lessons can be learned from a neat room, a clean building, an orderly presentation, and proper organization and discipline.
4. Teaching is an *incarnation of ideas*. Most people cannot define such things as loyalty and patriotism. They can, however, point to someone who has these qualities. It is easier to learn loyalty from a loyal person than from a lecture on loyalty. So the right teacher incorporates these ideals and others into his personality and character so that the pupil can emulate him and reach the desired end.
5. Teaching is the ability to *inspire learning*. Good teaching makes learning easy and, to some degree, fun. So the teacher carries not only the burden of teaching but also the burden of learning. He bears part of the responsibility of failure if a student does not learn.

Did you know that the Pledge of Allegiance was in the news nearly 50 years ago, when the words “under God” were first included? In 1954, Congress voted to add those important words, and the Pledge was re-written as we now know it. President Eisenhower addressed Congress after the resolution was passed, stating, “In this way we are reaffirming the transcendence of religious faith in America’s heritage and future; in this way we shall constantly strengthen those spiritual weapons which forever will be our country’s most powerful resource in peace and war.”

Our reliance on God is acknowledged in the words of the Pledge. When that reliance was threatened recently by a circuit court ruling, the protests were loud and strong from every corner of the nation—from small towns to the highest members of Congress. The words “under God” signify the unity we have as a nation, and acknowledge God as the source of our rights and freedoms, just as was the case with our Founding Fathers.

God's Keys to Prosperity!

At some point or another, we've probably all had the same reaction to a need. We hear about a missionary who needs support to return to the field, and secretly we hope that others will be the ones to raise the finances. Or maybe we hear the need for volunteers on a Saturday afternoon, but don't want to give up our errand-running day. Someone else will have the ministry gifts better suited to that need than me, we rationalize.

If we would be honest, we have likely uttered similar responses. Unfortunately, we miserably neglect that we too are a needy people. And it's only the mercy of a compassionate God that rescued us and gives us His grace day after day.

As Christians, we are redeemed into sainthood at no expense of our own. However, the flesh that's ours—the sinful nature that no longer has power over us—still tries to assault us at every turn, thereby making us hardened, insincere, and unaffected by the needs around us.

But if we want to follow Christ with our whole lives, we cannot neglect the pulling of our hearts. In fact, we must do more than face it; we must embrace its sway and act upon its leading.

We can give our time to worthy causes, our money to needy people, and our talent to an upstart ministry, but if our attitude is not right, God's principle of prosperous living is inactive.

What is God's principle of prosperity? "Give, and it shall be given unto you; good measure, pressed down, and shaken together, and running over, shall men give into your bosom. For with the same measure that ye mete withal it shall be measured to you again" (Luke 6:38).

Our standard of giving isn't based on who or what we're giving our time and money toward. Rather, it's based on the Giver of all good gifts, God the Father.

The more we get to know God by spending time with Him and asking our eyes to be opened to His work, we will be amazed and astounded at His continual graciousness toward us. It's our love and passion to serve Him that drives us to serve others.

When we're in desperate need of a friend, the best way to gain a listening ear is to be one. And the fastest way to have your financial needs met is to actually give away some of your own finances.

God's logic does not make sense in a world that primes us to hoard our talents, our time and our money. However, the touch of God transforms us so that we, in turn, can be used to transform others.

Here are the keys to putting your faith into action and developing a generous spirit, one that looks for the maximum it can give to others, regardless of personal need or the response of the receiver:

1. Focus your attention on *other people*.
2. Rather than just acknowledging that a person's need exists, *feel the extent* of his or her need as if it were your own.
3. Faithfully exercise a servant's spirit. Constantly be looking around to see how you can help.
4. Begin to favor other people. For example, if there's only one chair left at the table and two of you need one, give it to the other person. Put others ahead of yourself.
5. Freely give. Just give without attaching expectations to receive anything in return.
6. Frequently give. Start looking for ways to give more than you currently give.
7. Prayerfully give. Seek God's wisdom concerning what you can give.

Even if you begin with a stingy spirit instead of a generous one, keep putting these godly principles into action. In time, what once seemed painful will become pleasurable. As you surrender your life's resources to better the lives of others, the more you'll notice God at work in your life, cultivating the generous spirit that you crave. —Charles Stanley

That's why Patriot University believes it is important that we study the biographies of men and women, especially those who by faith have seen their lives count for God and others.

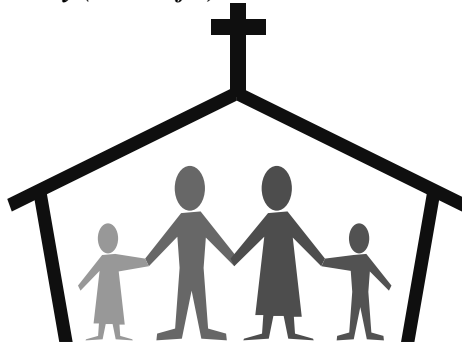

First, they're given to *teach* us. It is always wise to learn from our own experiences, but it is even wiser to learn from the experiences of others. It is usually less painful too! By applying the principles illustrated in the lives of Bible characters, we can avoid making some of the same costly mistakes they made.

Second, God gave us the stories to *encourage* us. We are encouraged by the fact that God chooses to use ordinary people to accomplish His plans, in spite of their weaknesses and failures and sometimes mixed motives. That gives us hope that God can work in our lives too!

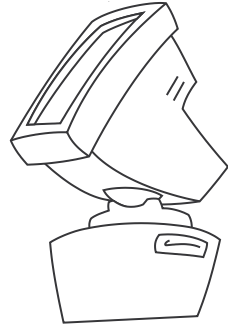

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Age of Reasoning?

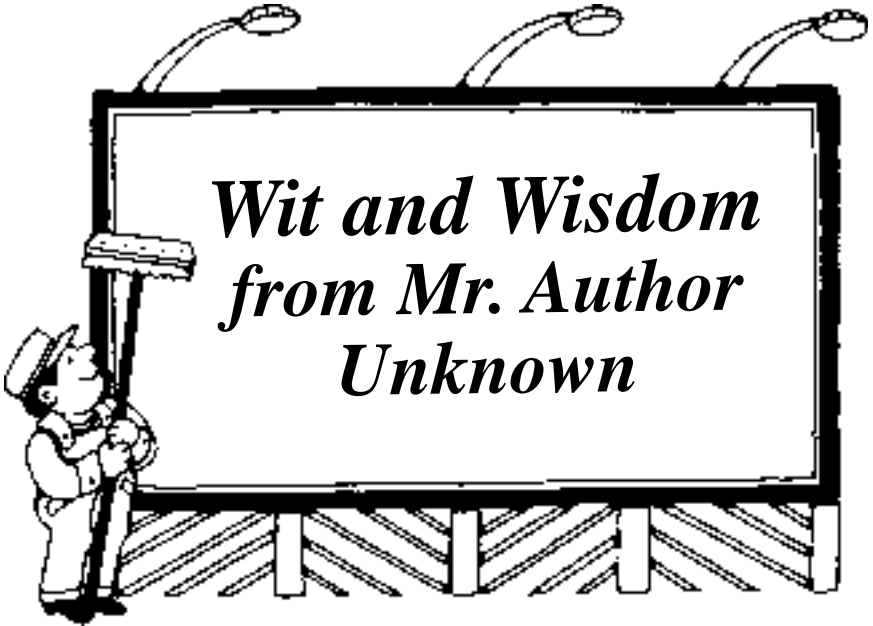
A recent study finds that college seniors are learning more about pop culture than U.S. history, science, math, and literature. A multiple-choice quiz was given to 167 seniors at state-run universities in Arizona. The 40 questions ranged from “Who was the father of the Constitution?” to “When does an object have a positive electric charge?” Students were also told to “identify Snoop Doggy Dogg.”

More than 90% correctly answered the question about the profane rapper — but very few were able to answer questions pertaining to constitutional authorship, statistical probability, and the Gettysburg Address. Although a majority of the students had a grade point average above 3.0, the group as a whole failed seven of the eleven subject areas included in the quiz.

Edward Hudgins, Washington Director of the Objectivist Center, says the low scores can be attributed to what he calls “the dumbing down of grades and standards in universities” and a failure at both the pre-college and college levels to teach people to use their reasoning mind.

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A Bible school student was asked to list the Ten Commandments in any order. He wrote, “3, 6, 1, 8, 4, 5, 9, 2, 10, 7.”

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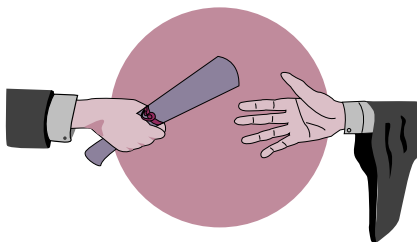
